St Mary's Farnham Royal



At St Mary's Farnham Royal, we have been doing a lot of eco-friendly things. For example, like when we want to open a door or window because it is too hot you need to turn the radiator down first otherwise you would waste electricity. As a School Council, we have been going to classes, making sure the lights are turned off and we have been talking a lot about reducing the Carbon Footprint in our school.

We have held Playground meetings to get people's opinions about reducing the Carbon Footprint.

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Butlers Court

At Butlers Court we have been working hard this year to make our school a greener one. We have Eco Warriors who have been voted by their classes. The Eco Warriors regularly litter pick around the school site and they have also helped litter pick in the local area. It was amazing how much litter there was around. We held a school competition to use recycled items to make bird feeders which will be placed around school. We also had a whole school assembly and met with a local recycling plant to find out ways we can use less plastic in school.

We have been trying to stay green during our sport fixtures and ask children to share lifts with others to avoid too many car trips to venues. Recently some of our netball fixtures were held nearby so instead of using cars, we encouraged all the children to walk to the venue.
